

The Forgotten 56 By Dick Stover

Many of you are familiar with my two tone green '48 Pontiac 2-door that I have had since 1973, but probably not the '56 Chieftain 870 4-door (2719D) I had in the mid-70's. I bought it when we lived in Douglassville, PA as a daily driver. It was dark green, 316 V-8 2barrel, Hydramatic, pretty bare bones except it had a radio. It was in decent shape, no rot. I gave it some regular maintenance TLC, belts, hoses, tune up, tires, and off we went.

I commuted daily from Douglassville (between Reading and Pottstown) to Devon, near King of Prussia, literally "over the river and through the woods" to avoid massive traffic tie ups. This was before Hy 422 was finished from Douglassville to KofP. Eventually I had a car pooling arrangement with a neighbor, so I only drove 3 days a week—we each drove ourselves on Fridays.

One Saturday I had it sitting in the driveway of our house and had been doing some maintenance on the car—I think I had just refilled the radiator, but had <u>not</u> put the radiator cap back on. I had put the hood down to the first latch point intending to come back and finish up. Jackie had said she need to run some errands and I said she could take the 56 when I was finished so I could flip over and work on our other car, an indestructible 69 Rambler American. I went in the house and when I came back out the car was gone, no radiator cap, Jackie and 2 kids on board. I grabbed the cap and chased Jackie down in the Rambler, popped the hood, put the cap on and sent her on her way.

The other more memorable adventure was our camping trip to Rickett's Glen State Park along the New York border to meet up with old neighbors from when we lived outside of Rochester, NY. The Rambler was too small, so, you guessed it, load up the 56, complete with roof rack (the old kind that had suc-



tion cups and straps hooked over the drip rails, remember those? See picture).; 2 kids minimally secured in the back seat. Tent, poles, and sleeping bags were on the roof rack, cooler between the kids, cook box, and clothes in that nice square trunk—off we went. Needless to say, we got some really strange looks when we pulled into the campground.



We had a great reunion with our old friends. On the way out of the park area there was a mile long hill (down) to a T intersection. Those 56 drum brakes did NOT like that hill even with pumping the brakes to breath them. I barely got the car stopped at the T. Yup, on the other side of the T was a nice stand of sizeable trees. Cheated disaster again!

Some where around 1977 the Rambler succumbed to Rochester and Douglassville winters and road salt. Failed inspection for unibody "frame" rot. Sold it to a truck repair mechanic. Next came the 77 Ventura, and for a brief time we were a 3 Pontiac family. Before the move to Langhorne we said good bye to the 56, good and faithful servant.

NORWALK 2024



Have you ever been to Ames Performance Pontiac Nationals in Norwalk Ohio? This year was my 1st year. Tim, my husband had been there years ago with the late Frank Kemp, but even he was amazed to see how much the show has grown.

Our plans were to leave Thursday morning, July18th. As we prepared on Tuesday to leave, we had a severe thunderstorm go through our area that took down trees, leaving us with no power. For a while it looked like we would have to cancel our plans in order to babysit our generator as the electric company estimated our power restoration at 11PM on Thursday. As our plans were to leave Thursday morning, we were very disappointed when we had received this call. But then, 8 hours later another phone call came in saying a new estimated restoration time was Wednesday evening. There was anything from fully rebuilt engines, literature, memorabilia, down to the smallest molding clips. Tim was able to find a window crank assembly for his 31 Pontiac, but most vendors catered to mid-50's and newer, being heavier on the performance side of



Pontiac. We stopped along the way to talk to long time KSC friends George Richardson, Tyrone Mount and Keith Vrabec. As we spent the better part of the day in the flea market, we could hear the racing going on as well.

We later walked over to the pit side of the track. Wow, there was a whole other city with 100s of trailers and Pontiac racers. As we were making our way through the pit area, we started looking for our friend, Paul Spotts who was racing his 69 Trans Am. The weather was perfect and 17,000 steps later we decided to go back to the hotel. Tomorrow would be another day.

Saturday morning, car show day and more racing. We again arrived as the gates opened at 8am. We walked through the gate with Dimitrie Toth who was representing the Pointiac Transportation Museum for the weekend. It was fun catching up with him.

Norwalk 2024 take two



Hallowell Tour September 21st

On Saturday September 21st, the Keystone State Chapter went to Huntingdon Valley. The day was set up by our host Hank Hallowell. 20 of us started the day at Hank's home with a story of how the Hallowell family started in our area and how the property has evolved over the years. Hank then guided us through his "car barn" that he built to house some of his car collection and memorabilia from auto related signs, license plates, and dealer promotional models to some childhood trinkets.

Our host then catered us to lunch by his pool where we had some time to catch up with fellow Pontiac friends. The weather was perfect for our outdoor gathering.

From here, Hank led us to the Glencairn Museum. The Glencairn Museum was built in Bryn Athyn by Raymond Pitcairn (1885-1966) in a style based on medieval Romanesque architecture. The museum was once the home of the Pitcairns and now houses all the art and medieval objects that the Pitcairns collected, The museum is set up in galleries that explore the religious beliefs and practices of a variety of cultures and time periods. Our tour guide Jim, started us off with a 15 minute introductory film and then led us through the 45,000 sq. ft. museum, once the home of the Pitcairns. We first visited the "great room" which was like our modern day living room but this room had 27' ceilings with tall stained glass windows and one whole wall made of 1/2" mosaic tiles. Our photos can not do this place justice.

As we were led through the museum, there was artwork, statues, and capitals, some built right into the cement walls. The "Egyptian Room" housed many small artifacts and one exceptional object was an Old Kingdom "spirit" door from the tomb of a priest of King Khufu which stood about 2' wide and 5' high.

Another prized possession is found in the Medieval collection. Here we were shown the Two-Foot Tall 16th -Century Hymnal from Spain, the only one in the United States. The pages were made out of cow-hide.

Yet another collection was the Classical collection which consisted over five hundred objects. The most spectacular piece is an almost life-sized marble statue of Minerva Victoria, which dates back to the 2nd century AD.

Our tour guide also led us to the tower for views as far away as the Philadelphia skyline.

Nearby on the grounds there are 2 other historical sights the Bryn Athyn Cathedral and the other is the Cairnwood Estate. The Cairnwood Estate and Bryn Athyn Cathedral were both built by Industrialist John Pitcairn (1841-1916) who provided funding for the project, and his son Raymond (1885-1966) oversaw the design and construction of this unique Gothic and Romanesque-style complex. You may remember John Pitcairn as a cofounder of Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company in 1883.

SCRANTON—STEAM TOWN FALL TOUR—OCTOBER 19TH

For our final tour of the 2024 KSC 50th anniversary year, we will be heading to Scranton, PA. to visit the National historical railroad site.

<u>LUNCH:</u> We will start the day with lunch at the Radisson Lackawanna station hotel, located at 700 Lackawanna Ave, Scranton, PA 18503 We will have lunch at NOON, then proceed to the nearby Steamtown complex. This hotel was the offices and Scranton train station for the Lackawanna railroad.

Also note they will only provide one guest check per table, so please bring some extra cash to help settle the bill.

<u>STEAMTOWN</u>: After lunch we will go the short distance to the Steamtown National Historic site, just behind the hotel. You can go through the outdoor displays, plus the indoor museum and displays. Train rides are offered at various times as well.



Steamtown NHS occupies about 40 acres of the Scranton railroad yard of the former Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad, one of the earliest rail lines in northeastern Pennsylvania. At the heart of the park is the large collection of standard-gauge steam locomotives and freight and passenger cars that New England seafood processor F. Nelson Blount assembled in the 1950s and 1960s. In 1984, 17 years after Blount's untimely death, the Steamtown

Foundation or the Preservation of Steam and Railroad Americana, Inc., brought the collection to Scranton, where it occupied the former DL&W yard. When Steamtown National Historic Site was created, the yard and the collection became part of the National Park System.

The Steamtown Collection consists of locomotives, freight cars, passenger cars, and maintenance-of-way equipment from several historic railroads. The locomotives range in size from a tiny industrial switcher engine built in 1937 by the H.K. Porter Company for the Bullard Company, to a huge Union Pacific "Big Boy" built in 1941 by the American Locomotive Company (Alco). The oldest locomotive is a freight engine built by American



Locomotive Company in 1903 for the Chicago Union Transfer Railway Co. *Steamtown National Historic Site Rail Museum, 350 Cliff St., Scranton, PA 18503.* For more details, including directions, log onto their website: <u>nps.gov</u>

<u>ALTERNATIVE TOUR</u>: Also on site is the electric city trolley museum, with a very nice museum, and which also offers a great trolley ride. Check details on: <u>ectma.org</u>


